


## SESSION 60: HOLY TEXTBOOK PRICES, BATMAN!

### What Economists Do

ECONOMISTS WORK ON A WIDE ARRAY OF problems, just a small sample of which are covered by the questions at the start of this chapter. Economic questions can be divided into two big groups: microeconomic questions and macroeconomic questions.

#### Microeconomics and Macroeconomics

**Microeconomics** is the study of the decisions of people and businesses and the interaction of those decisions in markets. The goal of microeconomics is to explain the prices and quantities of individual goods and services. Microeconomics also studies the effects of government regulation and taxes on the prices and quantities of individual goods and services. For example, microeconomics studies the forces that determine the prices of cars and the quantities of cars produced and sold. It also studies the effects of regulations and taxes on the prices and quantities of cars.

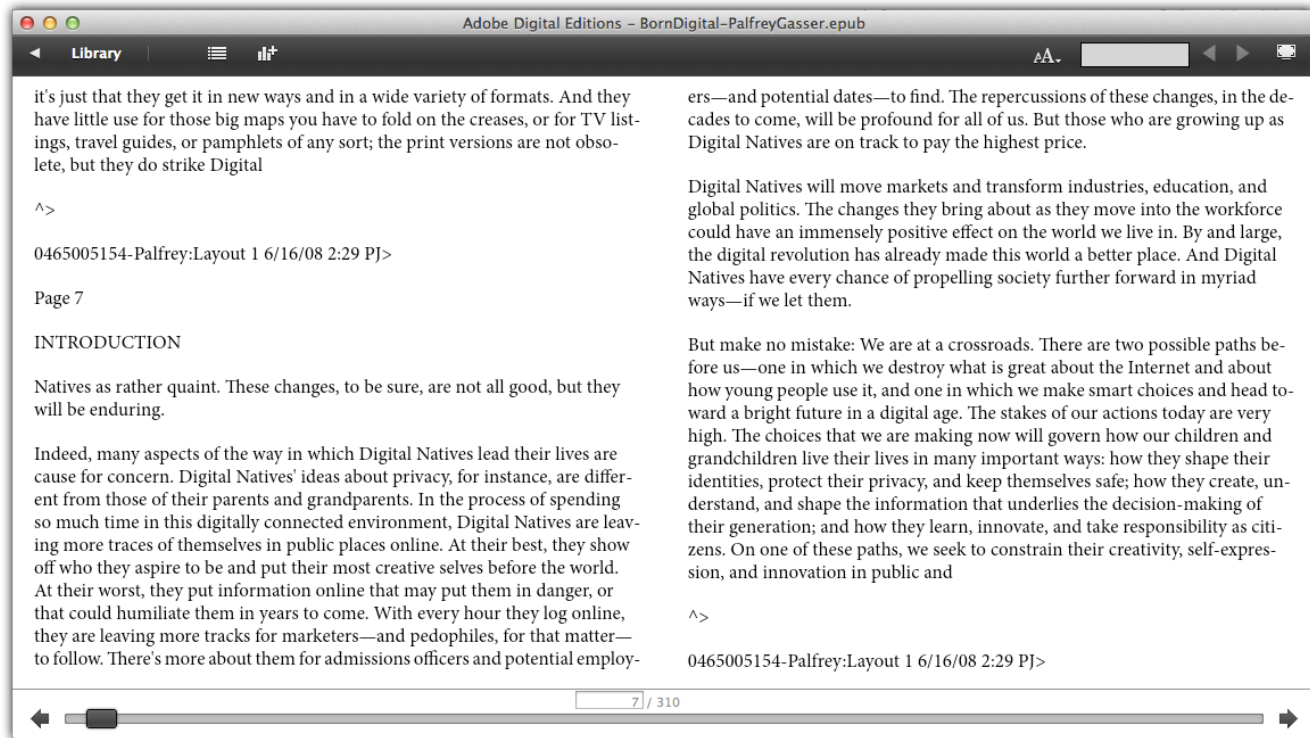
**Macroeconomics** is the study of the national economy and the global economy and the way that economic aggregates grow and fluctuate. The goal of macroeconomics is to explain average prices and the

It is a truth universally acknowledged, that a single man in possession of a good fortune, must be in want of a wife.



#### RULES FOR RAPID OBSERVATION

##### *The Fingers*
